Thank you for joining us as we seek to enhance the voice of the Latino community in Virginia. I am delighted that the Virginia Latino Leaders Council and VACOLAO have organized this event to bring what I hope will be one of many activities where Latino civic engagement is the focus, and the voices and priorities of Latinos in Virginia are realized.

By way of background, the origins of the Virginia Latino Leaders Council began last September, when a large group of Latino activists from throughout Virginia was invited by Governor Terry McAuliffe to meet with him and members of his Administration to discuss issues of importance to Virginia's Latino community. It was an excellent conversation on the issues that matter to our community and to the Governor.

Following the meeting, a few of us began discussing the idea of forming a statewide organization comprised of Latino leaders and activists. This group would focus on promoting the 716,000 Latinos in Virginia, per the U.S. Census, and an estimated 271,000 Latino eligible voters according to the Pew Research Center, into civic engagement in local and state commissions, voting, and on establishing a dialogue with the current and future state government administrations. These activities and a structure for Latinos in Virginia to engage with Virginia's government officials at the state and local level will be the focus of the Virginia Latino Leaders Council.

Even though we started with a small group primarily from Northern Virginia to organize the Virginia Latino Leaders Council, it is our intent to expand the group to have Latino representation from throughout the Commonwealth. We kept the group small initially to quickly form a structure from which we could effectively launch.

As we proceed to take the next step in bringing Latino activists and leaders together throughout our Commonwealth, it's my pleasure to welcome you to Virginia's 2015 Latino Civic Engagement Forum. Today, we will address a number of important issues relevant to our community. I am honored to have other civic organizations joining us this morning and to have Virginia Attorney General, the Honorable Mark Herring as our keynote luncheon speaker.

Latino Decisions interviewed 805 total Latino registered voters, nationwide from November 25 - December 4. Respondents were interviewed in English or Spanish, at their discretion by fully bilingual interviewers. The overall survey contains a margin of error of +/- 3.5% and on split sample items, the margin of error is +/-4.9%. Respondents were reached using a blended sample of landline telephones, cell phones, and the Latino Decisions online web panel.
